Monthly Profile: Charles Tynes



Charles doesn't remember a time that he didn't know how to swim.

Born on Acklins, a remote island in the Bahama chain of Caribbean islands, he learned to sail when he was five or six.

His mother and father separated early in his life and his mother, a nurse, moved to the capital city, Nassau, for work. Charles grew up being guided and nurtured by his Charles Tynes with his wife Lin grandmother, aunts and uncles. The mail boat came once a week, also bringing newspapers and other essentials. School was a one-room building ten miles from his home. Sunday evenings, children from his settlement were taken by boat to stay with families where the school was. They returned home on Friday. By the time he was eight years old he rode a horse to school, and when older, walked.

When Charles was sixteen he graduated from high school and within a year headed for the big city, Nassau. Soon after arriving, he was offered a job as caddy at a golf club. Having never played golf or been on a golf course before, he nevertheless said yes and went to work. His caddy career lasted one day. But the club offered him a regular job as house boy and he settled into life in Nassau. It was there that he became inspired to pursue a career in the hospitality industry. Realizing he would have to study abroad to achieve that goal, he enrolled in the police academy. This provided him a place to live and an income. Three years later he left for college in Florida where he could study restaurant and hotel management.

His first day in Miami he was shocked when someone yelled at him for using the white water fountain. It was his first experience with racism. He found, too, that the beaches were segregated, with signs indicating which was for Blacks and which for Whites.

When he, as best man, showed up for the rehearsal of a white friend's wedding, the minister was aghast and said that he couldn't be included. It took his friend's threat that he would take the wedding to another church to make the minister change his mind. And when he got a job in a hotel he was told there'd be no front desk work for him. He would work out of sight of the guests. The college he attended maintained two campuses, one for Black students and one for White students and was not integrated until 1964. While in college he continued to work part-time and got a degree in Hotel and Restaurant Management.

A classmate from San Francisco encouraged him to go to California. On his fifth day in San Francisco, he got a job as Banquet Steward at the Fairmont Hotel. Among his duties was overseeing kosher dinnerware.

Charles, who never lacked for girlfriends, had vowed that he would never marry, but when he met Lin, he began to reconsider that decision and they became a couple. They married before they returned to the Bahamas in 1967. Their first son was born in Nassau. A second son was born in Berkeley.

By that time, Charles was maître d' at the Canlis Restaurant in the Fairmont Hotel in San Francisco. He stayed there till opening his own business as a wine and spirits consultant, from which he retired in

This group will also be meeting on Thursday, December 7. We hope that everyone will all be there and ready to sing along.




Non-Fiction Book Group



Van Jones is a CNN political contributor and host of the recurring CNN primetime special The Messy Truth with Van Jones. A graduate of the University of Tennessee and Yale Law School, he was a special adviser to the Obama White House and is the author of two New York Times bestsellers. Jones founded the social justice accelerator the Dream Corps and has led numerous social and environmental justice enterprises, including the Ella Baker Center for Human Rights, Color of Change, and Green For All. He has earned many honors, including the World Economic Forums Young Global Leader designation and a Web by Special Achievement Award, and he has been named one of Rolling Stones 12 Leaders Who Get Things Done, and Times 100 Most Influential People in the World.

David Talbotis an American progressive journalist, author and media executive. He is the founder, former CEO and editor-in-chief of one of the first web magazines, Salon, which he founded in 1995, Talbot has worked as a senior editor for Mother Jones magazine and a features editor for The San Francisco Examiner, and has written for Time magazine, The New Yorker, Rolling Stone, and other publications.
