Member Profile: Maria Distler



Maria Distler

At eight years old, Maria Distler could converse in German, French, Tahitian and Chinese. Born in Vienna, her parents took her, as a baby, with them when they fled to Tahiti to escape the Nazis. Her Jewish grandmother, who stayed behind, died in Auschwitz.

Maria's mom home-schooled her and made sure she learned the same subjects as kids who went to

school. And, living in this nation in the middle of the Pacific Ocean, Maria doesn't remember a time she didn't know how to swim.

Tahiti was not the paradise the family had hoped for. Her German dad, an attorney, had difficulty building a career in the French colony. So, as soon as the war was over, her parents began looking for a way to leave. When her mom read in *Look* magazine that the U.S. was accepting refugees, she wrote for information about how the family could be included. As a result, they became passengers on a ship full of war brides bound for San Francisco.

So, Maria, at eight years old, already knowing four languages, began to learn English. Enrolling in a San Francisco elementary school and settling into American life sped the process; by 1951, the family had bought a home in Oakland and Maria was in Oakland schools. She graduated from Fremont High School and spent a year at Mills College, then enrolled at San Francisco State to study art.

But she was still in high school when she met Luther, a couple of years older than she, at a Quaker gathering. The Quakers had helped get her family resettled, and she continued to be involved with them. A conscientious objector, Luther was drafted not long into their friendship, and they stayed in touch while he did two years alternate service in Arizona. Upon his return they resumed dating and were married while they were both in college. After a few years, they had a son and then a daughter.

It was when the children were in pre-school that her connection with NOV began. Another mother whose children went to the school was Sandra Coleman. Maria and she have stayed in touch through the years. Meanwhile, when the children got older, Maria pursued a career working with children with disabilities until she retired, but still pursues her interest in art – both producing and collecting.

Shortly after joining NOV, Maria became a member of the Board. While a bad back limits her activities, she continues serving on the Board, participates in the Salon and usually attends potlucks.


