Member Profile

Lyn Tynes

When Lyn was a kid her primary means of transportation was roller skates. Growing up in Queens, New York, as the first generation



American in an immigrant Italian family, she had ample space to practice and plenty of streets to explore and lots of opportunities to connect with neighborhood kids. It was one of those neighborhood pals who had moved to San Francisco after college, who invited her to come for a visit in the summer of 1966. Looking forward to a break from her pre-med studies, Lyn came west, stayed at the San Francisco Y and began meeting people. It didn't take long for her to feel part of the community. So, when the opportunity for a job appeared

summer she accepted and reconnected with the friends she had made the year before.

Drawn to the energy of the nationally publicized political scene in the Bay Area of the 1960s, Lyn decided to stay. One of the friends she reconnected with was Charles Tynes. Their friendship quickly became a romance and they were married in December 1967. The turbulence of the Bay area at that time did not make it an appealing place to raise a family, something they both wanted, so they headed to the Bahamas, where Charles had grown up. This was an interesting time politically as well, for the Bahamas was making the transition from British colony to independence. Their first son was born there, but Lyn missed the energy of a metropolis so they headed back to the East Bay to make a real home for the family. Another son arrived not long after and in 1979 they bought a house on top of a hill in Oakland, where they still live.

Lyn, who, remember, grew up on roller skates, found a job that suited her well at the Berkeley Ice Rink and she was there for eighteen years. These days her major career focus is property management and tending to the big veggie garden she and Charles have every summer.

With family throughout Europe and a son in Canada, Lin and Charles travel a lot. Every other year they are gone most of the summer as they visit relatives in several areas of Italy and France as well as the son and his family in Canada.

But that doesn't stop Lin from being involved with community here. She met Sandra Coleman, who told her about NOV, at the Oakland Museum, liked the concept, and is now actively involved. As a NOV volunteer she visits members whose physical limitations keep them homebound, helps with the potlucks and frequently assists with short term projects.

Thank you, Lyn, for being with NOV. We're happy you're part of our community.


The exhibition will feature nearly 50 paintings by Claude Monet dating mainly from 1913 to 1926, the final phase of the artist's long career. During his late years, the well-traveled Monet stayed close to home, inspired by the variety of elements making up his own garden at Giverny, a village located about fortyfive miles from Paris. With its evolving scenery of flower beds, footpaths, willows, wisteria, and nymphaea, the garden became a personal laboratory for the artist's concentrated study of natural phenomena. The exhibition will focus on the series that Monet invented, and just as important, reinvented, in this setting. In the process, it will reconsider the conventional notion that many of the late works painted on a large scale were preparatory for the Grand Decorations, rather than finished paintings in their own right. Boldly balancing representation and abstraction, Monet's radical late works redefined the master of Impressionism as a forebear of modernism.

Katy Butler, The Art of Dying Well





Monet: The Early Years Legion of Honor

February 25- May 29th:

Monet: The Early Years will be the first major US exhibition devoted to the initial phase of Claude Monet's (French, 1840–1926) career. Through approximately sixty paintings, the exhibition demonstrates the radical invention that marked the



artist's development during the formative years of 1858 to 1872. In this period the young painter developed his unique visual language and technique, creating striking works that manifested his interest in painting textures and the interplay of light upon surfaces.

This exhibition is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to experience Monet's mastery before Impressionism, and includes paintings that are profoundly daring and surprising. Depictions of moments both large and small, with friends and loved ones, in the solitude of forests and fields and in the quiet scenes of everyday, offer new revelations about an artist that many consider to be ubiquitous.
