
Journalist Judith Coburn has covered war and its aftermath in Indochina, Central America, and the Middle East for the Village Voice, Pacifica Radio, Mother Jones & the Los Angeles Times. She co-anchored (with David Gelber) Pacifica Radio's live, gavel-to-gavel coverage of the Watergate hearings.

She became a Private Investigator, working on cases where accused murderers were headed to trial, with attorneys opposed to the death

penalty. Most recently, she teaches at OLLI, Osher Lifelong Learning Institute in Berkeley.

She is working on a memoir about Vietnam and the 1960s.

The Program Committee is eager to have a large crowd to hear what should be a fascinating story. Please join us




Non-fiction Book Group Friday April 26, 2pm

Scams and Seniors!

Trusting souls that we are, Seniors are 5 times more likely to be victimized by fraudulent scams than the rest of the population. We had a terrific presentation by Assistant DA Cheryl Poncini March 26th and she left us with several brochures and good pointers for avoiding this problem. One of the most important is to start talking about this with each other. Share stories and if you are ever tempted to send money to someone as the result of a phone call or email, talk about it with friends, family and financial advisers BEFORE doing it! Even if the sender or caller claims to be your favorite nephew or a grandchild.
