

James Tissot at the Legion of Honor Thursday, January 23rd 9:30

Although James Tissot was considered a Realist, he was a contemporary of the Impressionists and was a friend and mentor of Degas. Tissot's work is a rich and complex commentary on 19th century society, religion, fashion, and politics. The current Legion of Honor exhibit is the largest collection of his paintings to be



shown in over 50 years, and offers West Coast audiences a rare glimpse at the fascinating life and dazzling art of a man who captured an era. Space is limited, members and volunteers have priority, so please call or email the office to rsvp no later than January 14. The senior price of admission is \$25 for non-members and free for members. Our group may qualify for a group senior rate of \$20. Members may also bring in one guest for free. NORTH OAKLAND VILLAGE TURNS 10 THIS YEAR!

Years ago, Judith Coates, Sandra and Bob Davidson and Ruby Long, all still current members of North Oakland Village (and Judith is still a founding member of our Board!) had a big idea. They met to



talk about forming a village in Oakland that would support older adults who wanted to stay in their own homes with a community of neighbors and friends. This intrepid group was not all talk - by the end of 2009, they had filed articles of incorporation with the State and just a couple of months later, in February 2010 accomplished 501(c)(3) nonprofit status with the IRS for North Oakland Village.

We will celebrate 10 years of successes this year with our organization and the big question is - what kind of celebration shall we have? Do you have good ideas for a great party? Just to mention a few great stats: in a rough count, we had somewhere between 180 and 200 events, programs or outings etc offered to our community in 2019 - and that doesn't count all the cozy get-togethers, walks and movie outings folks arranged on their own. We fulfilled 264 service requests including rides and computer help as well as 170+ hours of home visits. These numbers represent delivery on the promise of our mission to provide community, connection, engagement, friendship, learning and services for our large circle of members, volunteers and friends. Thank you to all of you who have been a part of it in every way and very special heartfelt thanks to our founding mothers and father who took a great idea and ran with it! This is a good time to reflect on our past and to consider the future for North Oakland Village.
