
Census Workshop - Be Counted!

One of the many great ideas Jo Studer left us with before she returned to England was the tradition of an annual picnic. A year ago that was Gregory Finnegan's first experience with North Oakland Village. His wife, Robin, aware of the Village movement in Boston and Cambridge, went online to look for a local Village when they moved to Oakland in 2018. Robin saw the picnic on the calendar, she and Greg came to the park, liked what they saw and decided to join. Now he's on the Board.

Greg was born in Hawaii, with a career Navy dad who was stationed there and a mom who had come from San Francisco and was a civilian clerk for the Army. But he grew up in Redwood City, attended school there and watched all the post-WW2 changes in the Bay Area.

When it was time for college. Greg chose University of the Pacific where he pursued an innovative multidisciplinary program and earned first, a B.A. in Liberal Arts then a PhD in Anthropology from Brandeis University in Massachusetts. One's image of anthropologists doesn't usually picture them as librarians, but that's where Greg's path led, first at Dartmouth then Harvard, far from his west coast home.

When it was time to retire, though, he and Robin headed west again. By that time both their sons had tenured jobs at Bay Area colleges. One is a paleontologist at UC Berkeley and lives in the Temescal area. The other, at UC Santa Cruz, teaches geomorphology and has a home in San Jose. So now, the whole family is within driving distance of each other.

You can't miss Greg. He is the only regular at potlucks with a full, white beard. The next time you see him, shake his hand and say thanks for being part of our Village Leadership.
